GSDC OF CENTRAL OHIO, INC. MEETING WEDNESDAY, JUNE 22, 2016

The meeting was called to order at 7:40 p.m. at Iacono's by president John Ayotte. There were twelve members in attendance.

Minutes of the May meeting were published in the GUIDELINES. Charlotte LaRosa moved the reading of the minutes be dispensed with, seconded by Joyce Willis. The motion carried. Treasurer's Report: Sue Clark reported income to date from the shows of \$1,540.02. Amount for the Futurity is unknown at this time. Checking account balance is \$4,236.27. Joe LaRosa moved the report be approved, seconded by Teri Ayotte. The motion passed.

<u>Show Committee:</u> There is no formal report at this time. We received numerous compliments from exhibitors and those attending. Sue received a thank you for a job well done from futurity chair Joan Intersimone.

<u>Unfinished Business:</u> Marcy Wright provided dates for the Agility trial of February 4 and February 5, 2017. As previously reported this event requires at least 5 club members to be present at all times (doesn't need to be the same members). Marcy will discuss choice of judges with Susan Crank Rosemary Booth moved the dates of February 4 and 5 for the agility trials be accepted, seconded by Kim Quinn. The motion passed. Question was raised regarding insurance for the events as AKC requires a statement of proof. A hard copy application for the events with list of officers has been prepared and given to John Ayotte to sign and forward to Susan Crank. We are guaranteed \$450 a day by IncrediPAWS for the events

New Business: We need to select a panel of judges for our 2017 specialty shows. John Ayotte presented a list of potential judges that he prepared. Rosemary Booth asked if we should include Doug Crane since he was chosen to judge in 2015 but had to withdraw due to health issues. Vote was taken for the following: Douglas Crane, Christine Carter, Kathy Casteel, Steve Dobbins, Sally Hayden, Richard Lortie, and Kathy Potter. Results of the vote were 1) Doug Crane, 2) Sally Hayden, 3) Kathy Potter, 4) Richard Lortie, 5) Steve Dobbins, 6) Christine Carter, and 7) Kathy Casteel. Rosemary Booth is to contact judges in order selected.

Plans for upcoming meetings were discussed. There is a possibility that Tom McDowra from Royal Canin might be available to present a program. Also, since we're moving ahead with agility trials in February, suggestion was that we hold a membership meeting on August 17. Meeting is to be held at Iacono's unless change is needed for a presentation.

Joyce Willis moved the meeting adjourn. Meeting was adjourned at 9:00 p.m.

GSDC OF CENTRAL OHIO, INC. MEMBERSHIP MEETING WEDNESDAY, AUGUST 17, 2016

The meeting was called to order at 7:42 p.m. by president John Ayotte at Iacono's Restaurant. There were twelve members and two guests present.

Minutes of the June meeting were read. Joyce Willis moved the minutes be approved, seconded by Jon White. The minutes were approved as read.

<u>Treasurer's Report:</u> Sue Clark gave the report. There is a loss of \$33.52 for this period. Books for our specialties are closed. We cleared a little over \$1,500. Charlotte LaRosa moved the treasurer's report be approved, seconded by Rosemary Booth. The treasurer's report was approved.

Secretary's Report: Rosemary Booth reported that calls were made to judges selected at the June meeting with results of two not responding to messages and another with an assignment too close to our event. The following judges were contacted and agreed to judge: morning specialty - Steve Dobbins and afternoon specialty - Richard Lortie. Application for shows, request for parent club approval, and request to AKC for exclusion of German shepherd dogs in other area shows were submitted on July 20. Approval for shows was received on July 22. After receiving hard copy contracts from both judges, the panel was submitted to AKC and have been approved. Received a reply from Tom McDowra regarding a possible program. Since he does not reside in this area and limited number of members, it was agreed that it would be impractical for him to do a presentation. Emails have been received from a Bruce Dill who runs Serious About Dogs that provides some online services for clubs holding shows (no information provided regarding fees). Contacted Annette Severance, and she will be unable to conduct classes early fall due to impending surgery.

<u>Shows:</u> Request was received for list of trophies for our supported entry with Central Ohio Kennel Club in November. Teri Ayotte has purchased those, and the information was forwarded to COKC.

<u>Membership</u>: There were two guests who are submitting applications—Steve White and Marica Cherry (former member). Since our annual meeting is in September and Marcy Wright was not present due to illness, there was no action on their memberships.

<u>Unfinished business:</u> John Ayotte reported that Susan Crank applied for our agility trials on February 4 and February 5. Keeshonden club that had that date relinquished the dates, and the events and judges have been approved. Our club needs to have five members present at the event at all times, but working in the event is voluntary.

<u>New Business:</u> Nomination of officers and board was brought up for presentation at the September meeting. The following have agreed to serve: John Ayotte - president, Jon White - vice president, Sue Clark - treasurer, Rosemary Booth - secretary, board - Teri Ayotte, Roy Clark, Charlotte LaRosa, Marcy Wright, and Kathi Jo Zornes.

The matter of training was discussed. In view of Annette being unavailable for training, other considerations were brought up. Members with conformation dogs have been getting together on the grounds adjacent to the Franklin County fairgrounds' buildings and plan to continue through September. Charlotte LaRosa moved the club try to secure a building at the fairgrounds every other week beginning in October if there is no formal obedience training and provide separate times for members working dogs for performance and those working dogs for conformation. Joyce Willis seconded the motion, and the motion carried. John Ayotte will ask Pat Pillitteri if she would be willing to conduct regular training classes. Sue Clark is to contact Tim Shade to find out if the buildings can be rented every other week on Tuesdays or Wednesdays starting on October 18 or 19 and continuing through January. There was a discussion regarding payment for building rental (\$100 per night). Jon White moved that the club pay half the rental with those participating in class picking up the other half, Joyce Willis seconded the motion, and the motion passed. Total for eight evenings would be \$800 and those attending will pay up front \$400 divided by the number attending (5 attendees = \$80, etc.)

Guest (former member) Marica Cherry mentioned a program provided to non-profits by H & R Block that might save the club money on monthly banking fees. John Ayotte will look into the program and give report in September.

Annual meeting will be Wednesday, September 21. Meeting will be held at Iacono's Restaurant.

Joyce Willis moved the meeting adjourn. Meeting was adjourned at 8:55 p.m.

AKC News & Education: New Breeder Education Portal Launched

With sponsorship of Royal Canin, the American Kennel Club has launched their newest educational outreach via email sent on August 25th through their newly created AKC Education Portal. The website link to gain access to the AKC Breeder Education Portal to check it out is http://education.akc.org/akcedu.

From this AKC Education Portal, members can access 3 available tracks from which they can select- Breeder, Grooming Certification Programs, and Grooming Continued Education.

There are various courses offered within each of the 3 tracks that people can take. The course consists of a number of Power Point slides with narration to go along with them. Some courses have a study guide as a final prep to taking the test at the end of the course.

To get credit for taking the course, you must have an AKC account and password, then pay \$25 to take each course and must pass the test at the end of each course with a score of 70% or better.


If you don't pass the test the first time, you may retake the test as many times as you wish without additional charges for up to 30 days after you originally pay to take the course.

Courses listed under the Breeder track are: AKC Breeding Basics, The ABC's of Breeding Part 1, The ABC's of Dog Breeding Part 2, Keeping Your Breeding Program in Compliance, Practical Canine Anatomy & Movement, Whelping & Medical Intervention, and How Nutrition Influences Reproduction.

It would cost a breeder \$175 total to take and pass all 7 of these mentioned courses in the Breeder track.

A big part of the reason why the American Kennel Club has launched this program is to give opportunity for breeders who have paid to become recognized as part of their H.E.A.R.T. membership can have easy access to continued education, which is part of the requirements to being a H.E.A.R.T. Member.

<u>Editor's Note:</u> To see what these courses are all about and ease of navigation, I signed in & took the How Nutrition Influences Reproduction course under the Breeder track on 8/25/16. The material was pretty common-sense straight forward and took about 30 minutes to complete, including the test. The test at the end of this course had 45 questions; I earned a score of 44/45 on the first attempt. Cost-\$25.



Post Skunk Encounter Recipe

- 1/4 cup of baking soda
- one quart of 3% hydrogen peroxide
- 1 teaspoon liquid hand soap [not detergent or dishwashing liquid]

Bathe your dog in this mixture a few times and rinse well with warm water. The peroxide in the solution could definitely hurt your dog's eyes, so make sure to avoid getting it on the face. Rinse with contact lens saline solution if you get it into the eyes. *Safety tip:* There's no way to safely store it since the soda and peroxide together will expand in any container and possibly explode. Make only enough for one bath at a time.

This method is more effective and less messy than tomato juice, which merely masks odor.

The CGC Evaluator hosting this test is GSDC of Central Ohio Member Brandon Zornes.



Marine veteran Richard Hunter, the first person to receive an official guide dog trained for running has completed the 2016 Buffalo Marathon.

On Sunday May 29, Hunter ran the marathon with a time of 3:36:52. Hunter, who suffers from a degenerative eye disease called retinitis pigmentosa, is legally blind. Thanks to Guiding Eyes For The Blind, he was partnered with his guide dog last August. Klinger, a three-year-old German shepherd, helped Hunter train for his marathon race. Klinger and Hunter have been training together under the Running Guides Pilot Program. Klinger can run up to six miles at a time, in addition to safely navigating obstacles, reports TWC Buffalo.

Klinger has given Hunter's family peace of mind that he no longer has to run alone. And at the completion of the marathon, both Klinger and Hunter's daughter, Lindsey, were there to congratulate him.

"I wanted a model for my three daughters that you can still set ambitious goals in the face of adversity," Hunter told Time Warner Cable Buffalo.

Certainly, Hunter has achieved his ambitious goal, participating in the first ever blind/visually impaired division of the marathon.

And as for Klinger, "he helps [my dad] do what he loves to do," Lindsey Hunter said.

Social Butterfly: Tips on How to Socialize Your Dog

Proper socialization is the key to owning a well-adjusted pup who enjoys meeting new people.

"Well-socialized dogs are happy and easy to control," said American Kennel Club® (AKC) Canine Good Citizen® Director and Certified Applied Animal Behaviorist, Mary Burch, Ph.D. "They give a good impression to others and make the people they meet feel that they are safe."

Dr. Mary Burch offers the following tips on how to properly socialize your pooch.

- Start from the very beginning. Whether you have a puppy or an older dog, you should begin socializing him as soon as you get him. Make sure to have daily playtime together in order to build a bond with your new canine companion. Examples of play you can try are sitting on the floor and cuddling with or hugging your dog, playing with your dog with his favorite toys, or throwing a toy and encouraging your pup to retrieve it.
- Bonding must be with YOU. When bringing in a new family member, make sure your new puppy bonds to YOU and not the other dogs or animals in the household. Young puppies often miss the presence of their mother and littermates, and if available, will seek comfort with the existing household dog or cat rather than you. Limit interaction time your puppy has with existing household pets in the beginning, and spend lots of time with them until you are confident that your new companion has bonded to you. This typically takes a couple of days to a week or so. A dog who bonds with another dog is difficult to get to focus on human interaction and respect training, so avoid this costly error right from the beginning.
- See new people, places, and things. Try taking your dog on a walk to a local park, pet-supply store, or other places where you will encounter new people and new environments. When you're out on walks, give your dog a chance to walk on different surfaces as well so he gets used to new surfaces. These all build confidence in your puppy or young dog as they develop mentally and socially.
- Socialization never ends. Socializing your dog is not something that you do for a brief period of time and then end it. It is something that is ongoing and should become a natural part of everyday life with your dog.

Editor's Note: You can take a puppy to most local Tractor Supply or Lowe's stores for early socialization without exposure to where other puppies or animals are being sold like seen in many other pet stores. Be sure to call to make sure they will allow pets to visit before your arrival. Once your puppy is complete on all vaccinations, you can attend places like Rural King and local dog club puppy training classes for more socializing and training opportunities.

How to Decipher Your Dog's Bark

Have you ever wondered what Jeck was trying to say to you when he began barking incessantly? Dogs use a variety of sounds-barking, howling, baying, and growling-to convey different things. Here's some tips on how to decipher your dog's bark.

- Is anyone out there? Dogs can communicate with others far away by howling. When dogs travel in a pack and one gets separated, the lost dog will begin howling and wait for the others to respond. That way, he will know which way to travel to be reunited with his pack. Sometimes, dogs hear sounds such as a siren that they perceive to be another dog calling to them, and they'll start howling in response. It is also potential it hurts their sensitive hearing.
- Stranger Beware! Jeck will defend himself and his space against strangers by emitting a deep, explosive series of barks. This signals to the approaching person to stay away.
- Hey, I'm over here! Barking is also used to get attention. Smaller dogs that are doted on by their owners tend to bark more for attention, since they are used to being the center of everything. Attention barking consists of a long series of loud yaps. Once you give him what he's looking for, he'll stop. If you ignore him further, he will most likely keep going!
- **Keep away!** Growling is designed to keep opponents away, especially if your pooch has a family member he is protecting. He will let out a deep growl that signals to anyone coming close that it is dangerous to approach. It can also be a precursor to a potential bite.
- The hunt is on! Baying is a deep, prolonged sound that dogs let out during the hunt to signal that the quarry is near. This sound is unique to most hounds.


